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SYNOPSIS:

In his documentary, James Baldwin explores the roots of America's history by examining how "race" and racism have been dichotomized and used for explicit separation politics. Baldwin reveals how racism is institutionalized and continues to be manifested in America to this day. Baldwin sheds insight into the history of black representation in the states and focusses on three key figures within his life experience that are incredibly important to black history – *Medgar Evers*, *Malcolm X and Martin Luther King Jr*. It is through these three stories Baldwin confronts deeper connections of how America functions on segregation and pushes a narrative of the "other."

"You are formed by what you see, the choices you have to make, what you discover..."

The way in which we create knowledge shapes us. We must pursue justice and realize the systems and institutions in which are guided may be based on false regimes of truth. We must actively deconstruct the racialized norms which structure our society and realize how privilege is maintained in Eurocentric discourse.

"History is not the past...it is the present - we are our history".



We must acknowledge history and how its classification systems persist today. We must understand the intersectionality of oppression and how it is institutionalized. "Race" as a weapon of power dynamics must no longer be an effective tool of segregation in western society. We must learn from history in the present by educating ourselves.



"White is a metaphor for power."

"Whiteness" is about institutionalized white supremacy. Being actively anti-racist means critiquing notions of racial homogeneity.

James Baldwin juxtaposes these men's lives as a means of critiquing American society. It is through Baldwin's and these men's journeys that reveal how from the Civil Rights Movement to Black Lives Matter – America's history is still its present. The state of the country cannot improve unless we ask ourselves why these power systems function and persist.

KEY TERMINOLOGY:

"Race": A societal process that maintains divisions amongst groups of people based on signifiers of difference. The groupings of individuals based on "race" are used to uphold white systems of power.

intersectionality: Refers to the interweaving and interconnectedness of varying forms of social categorization that oppress and discriminate against people. These social groups interdependently disadvantage people, they also empower and subordinate others. This theory demonstrates how power and privilege operate in social contexts.

Institutionalization: the process by which something becomes normalized or conventionalized in a given culture/society.
